

i-Sports Projects...inclusive and inspirational

For many children, young people and adults with disabilities, sport can be a great way of creating bridges between themselves and the rest of society. At Brentford FC Community Sports Trust we aim to provide and support everyone with additional support needs and disabilities in as many sporting opportunities as possible.

Significant developments have taken place in our programme in the last few years. From an initial investment of £6000 by two partners (The FA and the Andy Fuller Marathon Appeal - a Disability Charity) we have built a £200,000 plus programme over 3 years part funded by The Football Foundation, Sport England and John Lyon's charity. This funding has enabled us to increase participation rates from 70 regular attendees in 2006 to over 450 regular attendees in 2009.

Our participants are involved in three main projects:

- Ability Counts: a school sport programme including football, tennis and kurling
- Extreme Ability: a 16+ programme which includes challenging sports such as kayaking, climbing and wheelchair football
- Panathlon Challenge: a borough school competition for participants in specialised adapted sports including Polybat, boccia and adapted indoor athletics.






















Nurturing Local Talent

The Advanced Training Programme provides a clear pathway for young players to receive a high quality football education, enabling them to achieve their potential. The programme is self sustaining through participant fees and has been in operation for over a decade. Players are recruited from across all aspects of the Trust including local schools. estates and holiday provision. Mixing mainstream football with indoor futsal, the ATP aims to nurture the talent within our community.

A 3 year financial donation of £15,000 from the Energy Efficient Homes Group has enabled players from within our social inclusion programme to make the transition from estates football to structured coaching sessions and teams, 400 boys and girls attend across 4 development centres, 36 weeks of the year. The highlight of the year is our participation in the West Country Cup in Cornwall, where our young players have the opportunity to represent the Trust in a competitive football tournament.

The introduction of Futsal over the past four years demonstrates our commitment to encouraging creativity, imagination and good technique in young players. Used for many years in Europe and South America, Futsal is an exciting version of 5-a-side football that uses a heavier ball and imposes strict rules designed to encourage skill. The Brentford Community Sports Trust FC Futsal squad has competed several times in France and won the FA Futsal National Championships in 2007. Our girl's squad have also been national finalists. The quality of the programme has been recognised by The FA with several invitations to demonstrate the benefits of Futsal prior to England Futsal internationals.

Examples of success include Ryan Peters who started out as an ATP player before eventually breaking into the Brentford first team squad. Multi-sports coach Jack Power-Smith was at the ATP for 5 years before opting for a career in coaching and obtaining a full-time position with the Trust. Max Heward is now the captain of the Trust u17s youth side having been at the ATP since primary school. Current Brentford FC youth team players James McCluskey, Ricky Valentine, Adam Cole and Bilal Butt all started out as ATP players.

...embarking upon its 18th year

Brentford Women & Girls FC is a Chartered Standard Club embarking upon its 18th year. The team illustrates how the partnership between Brentford Football Club and the Trust has been able to provide girls and women with the opportunity to play competitive football. A structured coaching programme with teams at u13s and u15s, feeds into the established senior team. The girls' teams also participate in the annual West Country Cup in Newquay and are currently u13 champions.

£7,500 of support from key partners over the last two years including St. George West London, Access Sport and the London Development Agency has provided the club with the financial support to expand and develop, enabling 66 players to participate twice a week.

In season 2008 - 09 the Trust provided coaching and management for the Richmond College Women's Development Programme, with the team competing in the English Colleges League.

BWFC has encouraged many young women to get involved. A good example is 17-year-old Shukri Abdi. Shukri has been playing football for 5 years and started at our Positive Futures project in Hounslow. In 2008, Shukri became a volunteer and has now achieved a number of qualifications including her FA Football Level 1 and ABA Boxing Level 1. Now established in the BWFC first team, Shukri is a positive role model for many girls, highlighting how sport can have a positive impact upon a young person's life.



Investing in the future

The Social Inclusion team delivers a wide range of youth inclusion projects that enable young people to participate in a diverse collection of sport and educational activities within the most deprived wards in Ealing, Hounslow and Richmond.

We are constantly addressing and adapting to the needs of our young people, allowing them to participate in activities they have requested on their doorstep. We support them to forge their own training and career pathways through enterprising behaviour and informed lifestyle decision-making within the fields of sport, youth and community work.

Our first project was Ealing Positive Futures, which began in 2003 with 1 full time staff member and a handful of casual coaches. In its first year, Ealing Positive Futures engaged with 350 individual young people delivering football and kayaking as its main activities. In 2009, the Social Inclusion team consists of 55 full time, part time and casual members of staff who deliver 11 main youth inclusion projects across our 3 targeted boroughs, as well as smaller session-based projects, engaging with over 2500 individual young people and delivering a wide range of multi-sport and youth work based activities. Our main projects are:

Ealing Positive Futures; Ealing Homes Positive Futures Plus; Hounslow Extreme Football Plus; Ealing KICKZ (x2); Hounslow Kickz (x2); Richmond KICKZ (x1); Acton Vale Street Games; Southall Saathee CSPAN Cricket Project; and the Villiers Youth **Inclusion Project**

Every single project that the Social Inclusion team delivers is done so in partnership with the young people, the local community and our statutory and non-statutory partners. Our ethos is partnership working and we do this in the belief that our projects achieve more for the young people when joined with others rather than operating independently.

We have various key partners ranging from national organisations to more regional groups who support our many projects through funding, strategic guidance, in-kind support, help and advice and as sounding boards for new ideas. The Social Inclusion team works with partners across a wide range of disciplines, covering many aspects of society including sports coaching, youth work, community safety, youth offending, policing, community cohesion, social exclusion, volunteering, training and education, employment and welfare.

- 85 hours of weekly sessions delivered 50 weeks of the year
- 14 hours of sessions delivered per day
- 12% girls participation in 2009
- 4250 hours of sessions delivered each year
- 40 young people volunteered on the project in the last year
- 25 young people progressed from volunteering into regular paid employment on our youth inclusion project in 2009
- Winners of the 2009 KICKZ Award for London Practical Police support through partnership working with Ealing Police

Social Inclusion staff were recognised at the 2008 KICKZ Awards. Perry Avery (18) was recognised for outstanding personal achievement alongside Volunteer of the Year 2008 winner Usman Jamil (18). Aaron Snares (17) was nominated as our KICKZ Volunteer of the Year 2009. Inderraj Sandhu's Street Games sessions were awarded the National Street Mark for quality of content and delivery.





















Engaging our community with its heritage, ecology and waterways

Introducing local people to kayaking and canoeing is our primary aim and in doing so maximising access to the Thames. Brentford Boating Arch delivers sessions at four venues: Kew Bridge Arches, Brentford Lock, Isleworth Pool & Acton Pool. Regular sessions include adult beginners, after school clubs, youth groups and family paddles.

We have expanded our provision to include kayaking for groups with supported needs and these include local charities, special need school groups, college supported learning units and local authority holiday provision. All our coaches are British Canoe Union (BCU) qualified. Thames Explorer Trust continues to use the Arch to it's full potential, getting their feet wet and muddy by delivering 79 educational classes to 2200 children and 376 adults per year.

Our varied programme is financially supported by Sport England and Access Sport and has recently received funding from the Department of Business Innovation and Skills, through Pro-Active West London. St. George West London continues its invaluable support for the Boating Arch project by leasing both arches and bearing many of the running costs.

A £40,000 grant has been secured from the London Marathon Trust to develop the Boating Arch. Work is due to begin in January 2010 on new shower and changing facilities. The future looks even brighter with London Youth Rowing confirming their interest in becoming partners in the second arch.

Part of the aims and objectives was to establish a new club within BBA for advanced paddlers. Edge Progressive Paddling have embarked upon a winter season of trips and pool sessions, providing a development pathway into discipline specific areas of the sport such as surf, white water and slalom.

Inspirational active learning in schools

Our schools programme offers young people the opportunity to engage in a variety of different sports with the aim of keeping them active and healthy through sport. With coaching qualification support for our staff from Pro-Active West London and Skills Active we are able to offer a variety of sports to schools including netball, rugby, cricket, basketball, football, athletics, ultimate frisbee, tennis, futsal, kayaking, boccia, tri-golf and dance. We also provide young people with a pathway to develop their skills in their favourite sports through our development programmes, boating arch and competitions in addition to our work with School Sports Partnerships on their gifted and talented programmes and

In July 2007 the Prime Minister announced the '5 Hour Offer' aiming to give young people the chance to participate in five hours of sport per week. We are committed to helping the government achieve this target, currently delivering 117 hours per week of curricular and extra curricular activities. At Chase Bridge Primary School in Richmond we deliver 15 hours of physical education per week covering teachers Planning, Preparation and Assessment time (PPA) and a range of

We recognise the need to compliment our traditional after-school activities with multi- skills extra curricular clubs that will encourage more young people to participate. Our experience over 20 years and current partners ensure that we are well placed to drive the multi-skills agenda forward over the coming years. Through our partnership work with Hounslow School Sports Partnership and Education & Special Projects (ESP) our staff now have the qualifications and training to deliver. Specific multi-skills coaches will encourage and engage more young people to participate, some of whom may have been lost to the traditional sports clubs and activities usually on offer. This will encourage school club links as we seek to encourage more and more people into life long participation with the added bonus of unlocking talent.

Sports Challenge 2010 - BAA supporting the new Sports Jam Challenge event

With the aim of building on the success of Sports Jam* a new event is to be launched for 2010. The Trust aims to be a catalyst in creating a multi-sport fund-raising event for all ages and abilities providing an ongoing legacy of sport participation.

*Sports iam is a collaborative event between the Trust, Access Sport and The London Boroughs of Ealing and Hounslow, 1200 young people were connected with 17 sports clubs through free participation sessions at the June 2009 event, held at Gunnersbury Park.

Streetsports backed by Hounslow Homes and British Airways

Following on from Street Soccer an exciting new project is currently being developed. Aiming to build on the idea of Olympic Legacy a range of sports will be offered on local Hounslow estates. New coaches will be developed and there will be an opportunity for a trainee coach to assist at the World Streetgames event taking place in South Africa in 2010.

Future Jobs supported by British Airways, The Football League and Premier

10 trainees will be recruited in 2010 as part of the Government's new Future Jobs programme. The project aims to offer new opportunities for 18-24 year old's who have been seeking employment for up to a year. The initial training programme will offer the opportunity of obtaining coaching qualifications and work experience over 6 months with the aim of progressing trainees into regular paid coaching work. British Airways have supported the Trust in facilitating the management of the new programme together with the Football League and Premier League who have been awarded the training contract by the Department of Work and Pensions.

The Football League Innovation Fund - Quality Assurance Programme

We are currently working with The Hounslow School Sport Partnership to develop a new Continuous Professional Development (CPD) Programme for Trust staff. This is part of a wider Quality Assurance programme backed by The Football League Trust's innovation fund, with match funding from Ealing & Brentford Consolidated Charity (EBCC) and Nicotinell. The Trust aims to bring in experts from a range of disciplines to underpin our Ouality Assurance Programme. We aim to involve Brunel University in the facilitation of the project. The result on the ground will be further assurance of quality and innovation for Trust partners and participants.
